

MESSAGE FROM JOHN NIXON, BOARD CHAIRPERSON

On behalf of the Friends of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve (FFRP) Board of Directors, I congratulate and thank our members, staff, volunteers, donors, and community partners for a stellar year of accomplishments in support of maintaining, protecting, and improving the natural beauty and bounty of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve. A second year of the COVID-19 pandemic did not deter FFRP from increasing volunteer workers, donations, and members. Work parties grooming and rebuilding trails, removing invasive plant species, and watering Monterey pine saplings drew new volunteers who have become regulars. Without live fundraising events, FFRP saw 2021 donations exceed most previous years, and direct and online outreach efforts added new members.

FFRP welcomed five new Board members in 2021, enhancing capacity and leadership for development, education, and Ranch projects. FFRP collaborated through funding with the Ranch owner, Cambria Community Services District, and other County and State agencies in a major, successful fire prevention



project, removing dozens of dead trees and other vegetation that posed a high fire risk. FFRP volunteers used the chipped remains of the trees to augment trails through the forest. Docent-led educational walks returned, along with educational programs for local school kids. Indeed, 2021 brought new energy and engagement to fulfilling FFRP's mission and vision, including two new initiatives that received funding for planning and design – a boardwalk extension that will connect the Bluff and Marine Terrace Trails, and a native plant nursery that will serve as an educational venue and as a source of native plants and trees for repropagating the Ranch.

The beauty and bounty of the Ranch are for all to enjoy, and FFRP has responsibility for protecting and sustaining its natural wonders in perpetuity. FFRP depends on the generosity of members and friends who love the Ranch to support the ongoing work of maintaining and improving the wonder and splendor of the Ranch. Please join and contribute to the fulfillment of the mission and vision of the Friends of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve.

MESSAGE FROM KITTY CONNOLLY, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Thanks to you, 2021 was exceptional. Friends of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve has rarely seen a more productive year. From cleaning up after January's deluge – more than 10" of rain fell in little over a day –to rebooting the docent walks, it has been a mix of continuing adjustments to the COVID-19 pandemic along with a welcome return to some long-awaited activities. It was almost as if we fit two years into one, to make up for lost time.

Here are a few of the highlights: 3,550 hours of work donated by 125 volunteers; school and public walks restarted; a self-guided field trip developed; access restored to the Wallbridge Trail; a bike bell program launched; native trees planted around the East Ranch Dog Park; our first online auction held; the forest surveyed for understory vegetation; 300 Monterey pine seedlings grown; 4 acres of gall rust removed; 11 acres of intensive storm recovery; miles of trails groomed; and a dozen bench dedications made.



2021 was a year of impressive generosity, too. Donations and memberships continued to grow, reaching all-time highs. We put your support to work enabling more activities than ever before. FFRP underwrote more than \$75,000 in Ranch projects. Of course, there were 96,000 Mutt Mitts in there, too!


Perhaps most important is how the Ranch continues to play such an important role in peoples' lives. Thank you for sharing your stories with us.

RESTORATION ACHIEVEMENTS

We were delighted that the Thanksgiving monarch count, conducted in coordination with the Xerces Society, revealed five times more butterflies than in recent years. We will continue to enhance and protect their essential winter habitat by planting trees and nectar plants.

RESTORATION ACHIEVEMENTS

Volunteers spent more than 2,000 hours on invasive plant removal and restoration projects, including weeding the boardwalk (see cover page). They seem to have had a good time, too!



2021 was a banner year for removing invasive South African ice plant. Removing ice plant allows native plants to return (pictured), improves habitat, and removes a heavy burden on cliff tops. Volunteers pulled tons of ice plant by hand, but FFRP also underwrote the cost to have it hauled away.



FOCUS ON RESTORATION

In January 2021, high winds and more than 10" of rain hit Cambria in little over a day, felling trees and flooding streets and trails. Between FFRP's volunteers and the Cambria Community Services District (CCSD), Ranch trails were reopened within days, but it took until September to finish all the cleanup in the forest.

Hardest hit was the Little Ravine area near Lodge Hill, where dozens of trees fell or were damaged. Carlos Mendoza, CCSD Ranch Manager, consulted a Xerces Society expert whose suggestions minimized the impact of recovery work on the monarch butterfly habitat.

Overall, around 11 acres of forest were dramatically changed by the storm. Fortunately, Monterey pine forest is adapted to disturbance, and new seedlings are already coming up where the tree canopy was opened.

Thanks to Ranch supporters like you, FFRP was able to provide substantial financial support for these storm recovery efforts.

FOCUS ON RESTORATION

One challenge in restoration projects is knowing where to start. Without a clear idea of what grows on the Ranch – the species and their abundance – it is hard to know what to plant. Baseline information is needed to guide restoration and monitoring of the forest.

To build that information, FFRP secured support from the Orange County Community Foundation for a study on Fiscalini Ranch Preserve. The goal of the project was to examine the plants that grow beneath the canopy of Monterey pine (*Pinus radiata*) and coast live oak (*Quercus agrifolia* var. agrifolia).

Natalie Németh, a master's student in Environmental Sciences & Management at Cal Poly selected this project for her thesis. In June, Natalie surveyed 38 one-tenthacre plots with help from FFRP volunteers who put in more than 220 hours on the project. Their contribution was essential to the survey's success, and survey results will guide forest restoration efforts.

IMPACT

FOCUS ON EDUCATION

Most organized school field trips were still on hold in 2021, so FFRP developed self-guided tour packets of the Bluff Trail for teachers and parents. The packets included a map of the tour stops, information and images for each stop, and an illustrated guide of common flowers. Topics included how to tell sea otters from kelp, the value of native plants, and the history of human occupation of the land.

The guide was a collaborative effort by board members Sheryll Ebbs and Rusty Burns, docent Duffy Burns, former board member Susan Loganbill, and executive director Kitty Connolly. Sheryll and Rusty are on FFRP's Education Committee.

The tour got rave reviews from Paso Robles parents:

"We had the very best time today at Fiscalini Ranch. We saw all kinds of wildlife, which made the boys very happy, including baby sea lions and sea otters. The guide they provided was fabulous! Next time, we are going to do the forest trail. Thank you so much. Made for a fun day!"

Do you hear ringing on the Ranch? Most trails are multiuser: pedestrians, bicyclists, and some equestrians. To make trail use safer for everyone, FFRP instituted a bell-lending system. A grant from the Cambria Community Council helped to launch this popular program.



FOCUS ON RECREATION

Preserving public access is a main driver for Friends of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve. In 2021, FFRP was able to restore access because of a partnership with our supporters.

Fiscalini Ranch Preserve has more than eight miles of maintained trails, including the Wallbridge Trail. Starting at Wallbridge Drive, off North Windsor Boulevard in Seaclift Estates, this path travels uphill to join the Dolphin Trail. As a route to the upper trails, it is very handy access, especially when the Ranch is busy. Unfortunately, a few years ago the footbridge connecting the trail to Wallbridge Drive became so unsafe that FFRP removed it. That effectively closed the trail.

Cambrians Chris and Mark Landgreen saw this problem and wanted to help, so they donated their own funds plus arranged a matching grant from The Coca-Cola Company for this project. Trail Leader Brian Morgan set to work designing a new bridge. With the cooperation of CCSD and a crew of talented volunteers, the bridge was reinstalled, and access restored. Working together, we reopened this 20-year-old trail.





WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

Plans are underway to upgrade the route between the Bluff and Marine Terrace trails with an accessible boardwalk. Richard Lee & Shirley Paulson-Lee and Loree Parral & Walt Andrus (pictured) contributed generous seed funds to get this project off the ground.



Habitat restoration will take a leap forward thanks to a nursery established with grants from the Orange County Community Foundation, Arthur & Elaine Johnson Foundation, and Reid Fund of the Ernest Lieblich Foundation. We will grow Monterey pine and plants for the forest floor.



MESSAGE FROM MARY MAHER, TREASURER

From a financial perspective 2021 was a very good year for the Friends of the Fiscalini Ranch Preserve (FFRP). Donations of \$198,000 were nearly three times more than those of previous years, with one-third of the contributions part of the Bench Donor Recognition program. Other sources of income in 2021 included \$36,000 in membership dues, \$30,000 in grants, \$5,000 from fundraising events and \$30,000 of other revenue. FFRP also withdrew from its endowment to support the organization's mission.

Operating expenses in 2021 were \$253,000, which resulted in a net income of \$114,000 driven by the large increase in donations. The organization's financials are reported on a cash basis, and a large portion of the net income will be used for projects in the upcoming years. In addition, due to the investment growth in the endowment, quasiendowment and expendable funds, the organization allocated \$70,000 to the special project fund, bringing the fund total to almost \$200,000.



FFRP maintains two years of spending in cash and reserves to protect against negative markets and related revenue impacts. The organization ended the year with \$531,000 in cash and short-term reserves.

The markets continued a strong performance in 2021, and the organization ended 2021 with almost \$4.9 million in long-term investments. This represents investment income of \$521,000. As seen in early 2022, market conditions are affected by economic and political situations around the world and can change quickly. However, FFRP's long-term investments will support current operations with judicious financial management.

FFRP complies with all relevant federal and state laws governing nonprofit financial management. The organization is also guided by internal policies associated with spending, investing, endowment, reserve and operating cash.


